American Humanist Association 2025 Conference

The American Humanist Association (AHA) of which WASH is a chapter held its bi-annual inperson conference AHACon2025 June 26-29th at the historic Palmer Hotel in downtown Chicago. People attended remotely as well. Like most secularist conferences, this one consisted of interesting plenary talks and breakout sessions with other allied organizations tabling in a common area.

On Thursday, June 26th, prior to the start of the main conference, the AHA held a set of training sessions for organizers of humanist organizations titled, "Building Humanist Power: A Workshop for Chapter Leaders & Organizers." These consisted of a series of sessions lasting an hour or less.

AHA staff members Jake Via and Emily Newman led the first of these, titled "The Power of Plan in Community Building." This was unique in that reminded one of childhood but were carefully designed to foster mingling and interaction between participants. It was unorthodox, but did force people to get to know one another.

The sessions that followed were more conventional training. These were titled, "Strategies for Youth Engagement," "The Ties that Bind: Models for Building and Strengthening Local Humanist Communities," "Community Days - A Member Led Program to Learn, Share, and Grow while Building Community, Ethical Humanist Society of Chicago," and "How to Herd Cats: Humanist Community Building 101 Community Organizing / Grassroots Organizing." A meeting of the AHA Board of

Directors took place that evening with conference attendees invited to observe for the latter part of the meeting.

The conference began in earnest Friday morning (June 27th). AHA Executive Director Fish Stark opened the conference with a plenary talk titled, "What Does 'Humanists Move America' Mean?" In his talk, Fish shared his vision of where the global humanist movement is going and the direction that the AHA will take.

The next plenary talk was part of the conference's "Big Idea Series" titled, "Flourishing in the Age of AI: The Next Great Humanist Mission?" presented by Dr. Narath Carlile. Dr. Carlile is a physician and humanist chaplain. He discussed how the rise and proliferation of Artificial Intelligence (AI) will transform our society and in particular how it might affect the international humanist movement.

Several concurrent breakout sessions took place Friday afternoon. These included "Jailbreaking the Red Pilled Mind: How Humanists Can Reclaim America from Conspiracies," by YouTube host Coleman Watts in which he discussed why so many people fall down the conspiracy theory rabbit hole and what we might do about it; "The Power of attendees participated in a set of games that Play," by Jake Via where he presented his teambuilding games to a wider audience; "Is Working with Religious Allies a Strategic Necessity or a Compromise of Humanist Values," by Vanessa Gomez where she explained that there are many religious people who share many humanist values and why humanists can and should work with them; "Rebooting Science Communication for the Disinfo Era," by microbiologist and AHA board member Dr. Christian Loyo who discussed the need for scientists to engage with the public and for the public to proactively engage with scientists in order to combat the sea of misinformation and outright disinformation that we now find ourselves immersed in; "On Reason's Shoulders: Reclaiming Love and Emotion in Humanism," by Humanist There was another banquet followed by an awards current situation in the USA where church and award than he. World Humanist Congress Is Moving to Canada

Humanists International is an international humanist organization composed of member organizations and individuals from around the world. American Atheists and the American Humanist Association are among the institutional members in the United States.

Each year, Humanists International partners with a national or local member organization and holds the World Humanist Congress in a city somewhere in the world. Humanists and secularists from around the world attend. Humanists International had planned to partner with American Atheists and hold the 2026 World Humanist Congress (WHC2026) in Washington, DC in August of next year. American Atheists, was planning to hold their annual conference jointly with the WHC2026. Sadly, in spite of the events having been long in the planning, circumstances have forced a change in those plans.

American Atheists and Humanists International have concluded that they could not safely hold the World Humanist Congress in the United States given current the political situation. International attendees, especially those from the Global South of which there are many, feared that they might not be able to obtain visas to travel to the U.S.A. or that they might face a hostile or even potentially dangerous situation upon arrival.

WASH, as American Atheists' DC area affiliate, would likely have participated in the event in a significant way and some of us were very much looking forward to it.

Humanists International is instead partnering with Humanist Canada and will hold WHC2026 in Ottawa, Canada. Many international attendees see Canada as a safer and more welcoming country right now.

WHC2026 will take place at the Delta Hotels Ottawa City Centre, August 7-9, 2026.


Baltimore Secular Humanists (BSH)
